BRYAN SHERIDAN

3RD GRADE (UNDER 19S)

In a competition that maintained the consistent good standard of the last four seasons the team won seven games and lost eleven (including one walk-over given) to finish fifth and twelve points out of the final four. Weston Creek, the form team of the year, won the Grand final easily from Manuka who once again had come through the finals from fourth position.

It is difficult to assess the performance of the team properly as it was not possible to field the same side two matches in a row. At its strongest it inflicted on Weston Creek its only defeat of the season and beat Manuka also; at its weakest it lost to teams below it.

Once again the main problem was a lack of numbers. Although recruiting was successful, it failed to fill the gap left by the very small inflow from the 1930 colts team. In the last three years, although very few of the available players have failed to take the step from Under 17 to Under 19 football, there has been a considerable loss of juniors in that age group who have moved away from Canberra for various reasons.

The team had a total list of eighteen players including three who achieved a regular place in the First Grade side. Under these circumstances it says much for the players enthusiasm and that of their coach, Noel O'Neill, that they achieved the results that they did. In this they were ably supported by two Colts sides whose players never failed to undertake a second game in one weekend whenever they were asked.

The most pleasing result of the season was that eight players achieved First Grade selection either on a regular basis or for experience. This underlines the need to maintain a viable Third Grade side as a stepping stone for the crop of good youngsters who currently are coming through the junior grades.

In a difficult season such as this, survival depended on an efficient back-up team. Despite his other duties, Jim Watt managed the team, organised top replacements when he was unavailable (thanks Max and 'Penguin), produced extra players then trey were cost needed and generally acted as the backstop in moments of tribulation; Gary Schmidt, as trainer, provided V.I.P. treatment despite the unattractiveness of early winter mornings; and Pat Brazel, Colts (Div 1) Manager, made life a lot less difficult with his active support in obtaining Colts players. Thank you gentleman.

REPORT FROM CHAIRMAN OF SELECTORS

This year's selectors for both first and reserve grades were Laurie Molaney, Bryan Sheridan and myself, Brian Falconer. We adopted a primary policy of relying upon under age players to fill vacancies in the first grade team which saw juniors Peter Bradley, Nigel Brennan, Haydon Daw, Dean Falconer, David Foster, John Lawson, Andy Foster, Gary Watt and Greg Watt gain valuable experience.

In hand with that policy we also saw the need to acknowledge notable performances by the reserve grade players which meant that Mick Burgess, Tony Cibiras, Ian Currie, Mick Dwyer, Rowan Falconer, Robert Goddard, Jack Juniper, Colin Milburn and Peter Wren were given opportunities, notwithstanding that some of the opportunities were limited ones.

New senior players in Peter Buchan, Dennis Hopkins and Mick Pledge proved to be valuable additions to the Club's senior playing strength.

The first grade team's performances improved steadily as the season progressed and it became a foregone conclusion that a team higher on the ladder would soon fall to us. That occurred mid-season when Eastlake were beaten by 31 points which proved to be the high point of the season for the senior team. That win was followed immediately by two more; a 99 point win against West Canberra and a 78 point win against Sutherland.

However, the team appeared then to lose its carefully developed mental approach to winning and its performances slumped just when more wins were needed to keep alive hopes for the fourth position. It was disappointing to taper off like that and players must toughen both their attitude towards losing games and their approach to playing the top teams.

In contract, the reserve grade team performed steadily and to the best of their ability. To have finished where they did seemed a fair result. The team was ably led and well served in all other aspects by Robert Goddard who topped the poll for the Club's best and fairest award. The umpires had other ideas and Frank Southwell struck a high note for the Club by winning the Tom Wharton MEdal. Congratulations to both Robert and Frank.

Congratulations must also go to Robert White for winning the Club's best and fairest award for the seniors and for gaining most votes for Belconnen in the Mulrooney voting. He will be sorely missed next year unless a player of exceptional quality is found to replace him.

We are grateful for the valuable support received from our donors and for Dave's help behind the bar in staging the after-match presentations. We believe that the 6.30 p.m. gathering back at the Clubhouse for the awards is central to development of team spirit.

As chairman of selectors, I pay great credit to both Laurie and Bryan for their skilful, enthusuastic and dedicated handling of difficult jobs. On may occasions, and only they would know them all, they went beyond the call of duty. It was my pleasure to work with them which goes also for the many others needed to run the show particularly the runners, the managers, the trainers and the ladies' committee.

BFC PROMOTION DIRECTORS REPORT 1981

1981 is the first year that the Club has appointed a member of the committee to direct promotional activities. Although the year could be considered a start in this field, the surface of promotion has hardly been scratched. Many new areas have yet to be broached and 1982 and future years should see a widening of promotional activities: aimed at publicising our Club throughout the Belconnen area and hopefully the whole of Canberra.

In the current era of high activity in many sports and a growing professionalism in the various football codes in particular it is becoming increasingly important that we have the confidence to promote and advertise curselves to ensure the maximum support for all aspects of the Club's activities.

Most members will be aware of some of the areas covered by promotions this year due to the proliferation of navy blue clothing articles being worn by players and supporters. Items sold over the season included: 'T' Shirts, Windcheaters, Colf Shirts, Pullovers, Weather Jackets, Cloth Badges, Football Carry Bags. In addition, Club Car Stickers and Scribble Pads were produced and distributed to senior and junior members at no cost.

Although there has been little or no direct profit to the Club initially, the longer term profits should be substantial. A display cabinet for promotion items should be mounted in the Club by the time of this report.

SPONSOASHIP: A number of people and businesses have been approahed to become major or minor sponsors of the Club and elthough results in this area have been slow, it is hoped that more of this support will be evident in 1982. However, there is an old saying that would seem to apply in this case 'Success brings Success'.

MISS BELCONNEN: One of our most successful promotional activities was the selection of Miss Stephenie Cattenach as Miss Belconnen 1981. Although not successful in her attempt to become Miss ACTAFL Stephanie represented the Club extremely well in her position and has set a very high standard for future titleholders. It is planned to build this promotion up within the Club in future seasons and hopefully announce the winner at our own Club ball.

SCHOOL CLINICS: Activities in this most important area were severely restricted by the extremely wet winter, particularly towards the end of the second school term. Clinics were run at a number of primary schools including Kaleen North, Macquarie, Hawker, St. Monica's, but many more were cancelled due to bad weather and wet grounds. A number of players assisted in these clinics and were very well received by the kids. Robert White, Bill Quade, Nigel Brennan, Tony Cibiras, Peter Wren, Wes Maloney, Kevin Damachke, Chris Brown, Max Cibbs, all assisted with clinics and their help is much appreciated.

NEWSLETTER: A Club 'Newsheet' was produced for 5 editions but lapsed for a variety of reasons. Lack of interesting Club news (or more accurately informants), lack of time, and little response from players were some of the reasons for its failure. Perhaps in 1982 we may be able to find a Club member to revamp the newsletter and run it more successfully than this year.

JUNIORS

The 1981 season saw the Juniors enter an extra 5 teams to take the number to 23. The Under 15s were the only age group where we fielded only one team and our numbers there were strong. We had four teams in the Under 10s and three in each of the Under 9s and Under 11s with two in each of the other age groups. Although our 2nd division Colts struggled for numbers it has laid the foundations for what should be two very strong Colts teams for 1982 and prospects of an end to the necessity of playing Colts in the Under 19s by 1984.

Belconnen was the dominant force in the older age groups with premierships in Under 1Cs, Under 13s, Under 14s and Under 15s. The years of effort and encouragement by coaches and club officials is now bearing fruit and gives clubs with the 'premiership at all costs' attitude something to think about. We also had runners—up in Under 9s, Under 10s and 3rd in Colts, and division 2 of Under 11s and Under 14s. The under 8s and Under 7s, where there are no finals, both finished second on the ladder. In what must be a record Belconnen fielded both teams in the Under 10 dviision 1 Grand Final.
